

DSCA Principles



- Civil Resources first and fully utilized
- A temporary measure
- A potential mission for all National Guard units
- Executed on a mission request basis
- Remains under command and control of Guard authority, never civil authority



National Guard Support



 First line of military response during domestic emergencies

 Organized and trained force that provides the executive of each state a diverse response capability



LEGAL AUTHORITY



- CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES
- CONSTITUTION OF VIRGINIA
- VIRGINIA STATE CODE, TITLE 44 (Emergency and Military Laws), CHAPTER 1, MILITARY LAWS ARTICLE 7, SECTION 44-75.1
 - Invasion or Resurrection
 - Person(s) Obstruction Execution Laws
 - Law Enforcement Assistance
 - Natural and Man Made Disasters
 - Lesser Emergencies



The Guard's Unique Dual Mission



Federal

- Support U.S. national military objectives by providing trained and equipped units for immediate mobilization


State

- Support of the Governor by providing trained personnel and unit equipment capable of deploying to protect life and property, and maintain peace, order, and public safety

FEDERALIZATION



 POSSE COMITATUS – LOSE GUARD AS LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSET

 GOVERNOR CANNOT RECALL FROM FEDERAL DUTY

 IT IS NORMALLY PREFERRED FOR NATIONAL GUARD TO REMAIN UNDER THE GOVERNOR'S CONTROL



Command and Control



- When NOT in Federal Service, the Governor:
 - Is Commander in Chief
 - Can deploy forces IAW state law
- Exercises command through the Adjutant General (TAG)



DMA COMMAND STRUCTURE










SAD Mission Process







- UNDER CONTROL OF MILITARY CHAIN OF COMMAND
- AUTHORIZED DIRECT COORDINATION WITH SUPPORTED AGENCY
- MAY ACCEPT ADDITIONAL MISSIONS FROM SUPPORTED AGENCY WITHIN ORIGINAL SCOPE
- SUPPORT CANNOT BE TRANSFERRED TO ANOTHER AGENCY WITHOUT PRIOR APPROVAL
- ADDITIONAL ASSETS MUST BE APPROVED BY HIGHER HEADQUARTERS



24/7 JOC Operations




- Since MAR 2004 JFHQ-VA has operated a 24 hour JOC
- Prior to MAR 04 JOC phones were forwarded to VDEM during non-duty hours (nights/weekends /holidays).
- NGB augmented JOC in 5 states, including VA, with civilian contractors in April 05.



Upon Arrival on an incident we can assess, advise and

Assess a suspected nuclear, biological, chemical, or radiological event in support of the local

> Advise civilian responders regarding appropriate actions, and;

> > for assistance to expedite arrival of additional state and federal assets to help save lives, prevent human mitigate great property damage.

Facilitate requests

- Full response requires local, state, and federal assets suffering, and
- State response includes National Guard

LIMITATIONS

- Can not perform Mass Decontamination
- Can not conduct EOD operations
- Can not conduct large scale NBC operations



The Virginia National Guard Incident Response Force



- The Incident Response Force (IRF) rapidly provides a trained force of 500 National Guard Soldiers to augment Virginia State Police or other civilian authorities.
- The IRF is organized into two separate units. Each is organized around a National Guard Battalion.
- The VA National Guard IRF has the mission of activating and deploying from their armories with an initial force 4-8 hours of receiving the call.
- Capabilities include:
 - Area and Point security
 - Crowd and traffic control
 - Restoration of and Maintaining law and order
 - Support to WMD/CST operations



Virginia Defense Force



- Virginia Defense Force augments the VNG during SAD mission and other emergencies
 - Provides additional manpower in VDEM EOC
 - Provides additional staffing for JOC
 - Provides additional resources for missions
 - During Hurricane Isabelle, VDF provided HF radio operators at water distribution sites and in JOC
 - During Hurricane Isabelle, VDF provided admin support to several shelters in Tidewater/Eastern Shore
 - During Governors inaugural, VDF provided 75 members to assist with traffic and parade control
- The VDF operates as an MSC under JFHQ-VA

Defense Support to Civilian Authorities (DSCA) TY - 05



- Does not include community support
- Four Separate Missions
 - WVA EMAC for trucks 1 OCT 04 8 FEB 05
 - Equipment loan to WVARNG supported by 2 soldiers
 - Boy Scout Jamboree Support 1 MAR 05 20 AUG 05
 - 150 soldiers supported BSA Jamboree by providing logistic, program and security support
 - Books for Africa 26 MAY 05 30 JUN 05
 - 25 Soldiers supported a request from VA Dept. of Education to collect used text books from VA schools to be donated to Africa
 - Hurricane Ophelia 3 SEP 05 16 SEP 05
 - 78 Soldiers deployed to Norfolk and Onancock in preparation for Hurricane Ophelia
 - VDEM EOC manned.
 - Ophelia did not make landfall



Defense Support to Civilian Authorities (DSCA) TY - 06



- Does not include community support
- Three Separate missions
 - Gov. Award Ceremony 11 NOV 05
 - 60 Soldiers and Airmen supported or participated
 - Water Relief 10 OCT 05 17 JAN 06
 - 36 Soldiers trucked, stored and pumped water to alleviate a severe local shortage
 - Governors Inaugural 14 JAN 06 14 JAN 06
 - 170 Soldiers and 75 members of the Virginia Defense Force supported the Governor's Inaugural



HLD/HLS Non-SAD DSCA Missions 2004 to 2006

Airport Security Mission 2004

- Planning exercise only to augment security of Dulles International and Reagan International with a battalion of Soldiers at each
- On site recon and rehearsals conducted during IDT
- Coordination with Airport Authorities and TSA Conducted
- Threat level never raised to level requiring implementation

DP 04

- Simulation involved near simultaneous terrorist strikes on a ferry in the Chesapeake Bay, the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel, the Richmond International Raceway, with a follow on strike at a mall in Short Pump, VA
- Over 500 Virginia ARNG soldiers played an active role in the exercise
- VA portion of Exercise lasted four days.
- The 34th CST and the Incident Response Forces deployed to incident sites as part of the exercise.



HLD/HLS Non-SAD DSCA Missions 2004 to 2006



2 of 2

- Winterfreeze 2005 9 NOV 04 16 DEC 04
 - Two Soldiers from Counter Drug flew missions on the Northern Border
- 55th Presidential Inauguration 18 JAN 05 22 JAN 05
 - 110 Soldiers Augmented State and Federal Security
- Hurricane Katrina Support 29 AUG 05 3 NOV 05
 - 728 Soldiers and Airmen provided relief to Louisiana and Mississippi in 4 separate task forces
 - Three Task Forces were true joint Task Forces at the squad level
 - C12 Also supported DOD effort in LA
 - Three Virginia NG Soldiers augmented Pentagon EOC
 - All Support performed under EMAC

- MOU between DC, MD and VA signed 15JUL2004
- MOU between DC, DE, MD, WV, PA and VA signed 19MAY2005
- Event Support: Presidential Inaugural, State of the Union Address
- State Funeral Plans
- Communications checks
