European Response

Since 2014, over 1.6 million migrants and asylum seekers have arrived by sea to Europe. European countries registered over 3.18 million new asylum applications. Over 700,000 applicants were granted a form of protective status, mostly in Germany, France, Sweden, Italy, and the Netherlands, with 450,000 applicants rejected in the same time period, and over 1.1 million pending applications at the end of 2016. Amendments to the Schengen Border Code. proposed in response to terrorist threats, aim to strengthen external borders by requiring systematic database checks at entry and exit.

Relocation Efforts since Sep. 2015

As of March, 27 countries have pledged to make over **26,790** spaces available for asylum seekers* currently in Italy and Greece. Authorities have relocated over **4,700** asylum seekers in Italy, where Italian authorities have so far registered 5.300-5.800 eligible Eritreans, and **11.200** asylum seekers in Greece, where Greece has registered about 20,000-25,000 currently eligible persons.


Resettlement Efforts since July 2015

Since agreeing to resettle 22,500 displaced persons in need of international protection over a two year period, European counties have resettled over **14,400** persons, primarily Syrian refugees hosted by Jordan, Lebanon, and Turkey. These include **4,603** Syrians resettled from Turkey pursuant to the EU-Turkey statement.

Italy

About 1900 migrants and asylum seekers arrived weekly to Italy in the first few months of 2017. A new Italian law calls for a series of measures, aligned with UNICEF recommendations, to protect refugee and migrant children in Italy where nearly 2,000 unaccompanied and separated children arrived in early 2017 in addition to almost 26,000 in 2016.

Greece

About 280 migrants and asylum seekers arrived weekly to Greece in the first few months of 2017. Greece hosts an estimated 40-60,000 migrants and asylum seekers, including 2,000 unaccompanied minors, and is working with partners to improve accommodation conditions.
