"...information gathered and activities conducted to protect against espionage, other intelligence activities, sabotage, or assassinations conducted for or on behalf of foreign powers, organizations or persons, or international terrorist activities" (see E.O. 12333 § 3.4(a))

The Evolving Intelligence Threat

From: "Symmetric (Traditional)"

- -Foreign officials
- -"Known/Suspected" Intelligence Officers
- Establishment (I.e., Embassies, Consulates and Media organizations)

Increasingly...

To: "Asymmetric (Non-traditional)" "Other" non-official foreign nationals -Including students, researchers, business travelers, etc., -Foreign employees
