Hoax Letters Target Financial Institutions

There has been a rash of white powder letters sent to financial institutions (both banks and FDIC offices) in around the country. The letters have been postmarked from Amarillo, TX with no return address.

There have been no reports of injuries at this time and all persons exposed remain asymptomatic at this time.

Specifically related to the NCR a threat letter was received at the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) building in Arlington, VA, on October



20,2008 and the FDIC downtown offices on October 23, 2008.

The letters contained a threat: "you've been stealing money from us...face reprocusions...you will die in ten days." (sic) The writing on the letter and envelope were typewritten and the envelope contained no return address. The letter was postmarked from Amarillo, TX. JTTF/NCRS are currently investigating.

The DC Fire and EMS Hazardous Materials Units Test Results on the white powder were as follows:

20/20 Results Negative for Protein Haz Mat ID – Inconclusive AHURA – calcium carbonate (not reliable)
